Margherita Acciaro, Università di Pisa – Université Paris Est-Créteil *The Chimney Sweep of 3 January. A Child Hero in 1848 Milan?*

During the 19th Century, the chimney sweep took on new meanings from both a social and a symbolic perspective. In Italy, this social actor was integrated in the national-patriotic communication during the *Lungo Quarantotto*. The present article analyses how a child chimney sweep was vested with heroical connotations within the political discourse around the revolution of 1848 in Milan. Focusing on the role of the young chimney sweeper during the uprising of 3 January, the article deals with the childhood revolutionary experience and its reception both in contemporary political narratives and in later memory.

Ludovico Matrone, Università di Torino «Atrocities agains the Military»: Political Violence in the Sicilian Uprising of 1866

Between 16 and 22 September 1866, Palermo was the scene of a popular antigovernment uprising. Thousands of people rose up and numerous armed bands arrived from neighbouring towns. Historians of the Palermo revolt have not examined in depth the practices of extreme violence against the police agents, including torture and mutilation of the bodies of the agents who were killed. Some scholars even dismissed such practices, either denying their reality or minimising them. By analysing the uprisings in the towns of Misilmeri and Ogliastro, this article reconstructs the process leading to the mass murder of *Carabinieri* and policemen. The available documentation thus allows to verify the narratives concerning the alleged atrocities committed by the rebels.

Antonio De Marco, Università di Verona Buffalo Bill's Wild West in Tuscany and the Italians'«Desire for America», 1890-1906

In *fin-de-siècle* Italy, journalists, intellectuals, and wealthy travelers promoted a vision of the United States as land of modernity, extravagance, and exuberance. This corpus of images and stereotypes fueled a growing interest in America, a sort of "proto-Americanization", and served to interpret everything originating from it. When Buffalo Bill's Wild West toured the Peninsula in 1890 and 1906, Italians approached the show and its various aspects – advertising, internal organization, program acts – through the same conceptual framework. Tuscany, visited during both tours, and the impressions of its inhabitants about the show provide an excellent case study to investigate these ideas, their function, and diffusion in Italian society at the time.

Piedmont under the Lion's Gaze. Uprisings and Revolutionary Propaganda in the Correspondence of Venetian Diplomats in Turin, 1790-1792

The correspondence of Venetian diplomatic agents in Turin from 1790 to 1792 allows to focus on two key issues: the onset of insurrections in Piedmont and the influence of French propaganda. The documents clarify the Venetian Republic's response to the revolution. In this regard, the Kingdom of Sardinia provided an initial model for addressing the challenges introduced by the revolution. Analysing how Venetian diplomats interpreted social turmoil and uprisings in Piedmont, the article sheds light both on interstate dynamics within the Italian Peninsula and the he circulation of information, printings, and individuals.
